This had a significant impact on the provision of Immigrant and Nonimmigrant Visa-related services. Posts were only able to resume limited services on a post-by-post basis beginning in July 2020, as local conditions allowed.

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*FY 2021-FY 2024 data include Conditional SQ Visa Category (CQ) included in SQ totals - Certain Afghan special immigrant visa (SIV) applicants who were physically present in Afghanistan and had completed all steps of the Afghan SIV application process except for the panel physician exam, and were deemed eligible, issued CQ visas pursuant to a medical exam waiver authorized by the Secretary of State and the Secretary of Homeland Security in August 2021. The SQ visa category is for Iraqis and Afghans employed by or on behalf of the U.S. government, or by the International Security Assistance Force or its successor, and Iraqi and Afghan SI cases converted under Section 1244.

¹Section 5104 of the National Defense Authorization Act for FY 2024 (formerly known as the “GRATEFUL Act”) authorized up to 3,500 visas to be issued in FY 2024 and up to 3,000 visas to be issued in FY 2025 and each fiscal year thereafter to special immigrant employees of the U.S. government abroad and family members, and the surviving spouses and children of certain deceased employees, under INA 101(a)(27)(D), for whom an employment-based fourth preference (EB-4) visa is not immediately available.
