



U.S. Embassy Muscat, Oman

Please follow the steps below before your immigrant visa interview at the U.S. Embassy in Muscat, Oman. Please note, you will need to make TWO visits to the Embassy. Starting June 17, 2025, U.S. Embassy Muscat is implementing a new mandatory process and applicants **must** attend an In-Person Prescreening at the Embassy **one week prior** to their scheduled visa interview date. This appointment will include a review of all required original documents in advance of applicants' actual interview with the Consular Officer. This will increase applicants' chances of being approved on their appointment day and minimize follow-up appointments. This change will affect all Immigrant Visa applicants with appointments scheduled on or after June 17, 2025. Any applicants who fail to appear for their In-Person Prescreening appointment will have their Prescreening completed on the day of their interview and they will be required to return to the Embassy one week later to complete the officer interview.

Step 1: Register your address online

You need to register your address online. Visit www.ustraveldocs.com, Select "An Immigrant Visa", Create a profile (Green Visa Login button), Enter your accurate contact information (email and mobile phone), Select "IV Address Registration" from the Post Visa Category selection and Choose your document return preference.

Upon completion of the process, you will receive a confirmation letter that you have successfully completed the process. This provides us with the information we need to return your passport and documents after your interview at the location of your preference. Click the "Register" button below and print two copies of the confirmation page once you are done.

- **You must bring two copies of the confirmation on the day of your visa interview. If you fail to bring the confirmation page(s) on the day of the interview or do not include information related to all of the people and passports, your interview may be rescheduled.**

Step 2: Get a medical exam in Oman

As soon as you receive your appointment date, you must schedule a medical exam in Oman. Click the "Medical Exam Instructions" button below for a list of designated doctors' offices in Oman. Please schedule and attend a medical exam with one of these doctors before your interview. The Medical Exam **must** be scheduled at least 8 business days prior to the interview date. Applicants who do not complete their medical exam more than 8 business days before their interview date may have their interview day rescheduled.

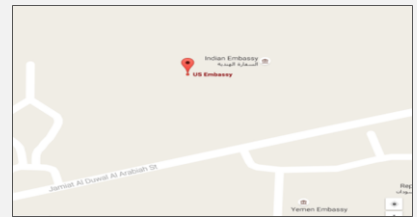

Step 5: Attend your mandatory In-Person Prescreening at the Embassy

Starting June 17, 2025, U.S. Embassy Muscat will be implementing a new mandatory process and requiring applicants to attend an In-Person Prescreening at the Embassy one week prior to their scheduled visa interview date.

The In-Person Prescreening will take place one week before your scheduled interview at the same time. Please bring all required documents to the appointment. During the appointment, Consular team members will collect your fingerprints and photograph, confirm your passport information, review all documents and advise applicants what documents, if any, are missing. This process will reduce the time spent in our waiting room on the day of the interview and will significantly increase the chances each application can be approved on the day of the interview.

Medical Exam Instructions



All immigrant visa applicants, regardless of age, require a medical examination prior to the issuance of a visa. Only a physician accredited by the U.S. Embassy can perform this exam. **It is your responsibility to schedule a medical exam with one of the doctors listed below at least 8 business days before your visa interview** at the U.S. Embassy. Medical examination results from other physicians will not be accepted.

Items to bring to your medical examination

The doctor will need the following items to complete the medical exam forms:

- Your visa interview letter,
- Form DS-260 confirmation page
- Your passport,
- Three (3) recently taken passport-sized color photographs,
- A copy of your immunization records, and
- Medical records, including prescription information, for any medical conditions you currently have

You must pay all medical examination fees, including x-ray and blood test fees, directly to the physician. The basic medical exam fee is Omani Rials 75.000 for applicants 15 years and older, and Omani Rials 15.000 for applicants under 15 years of age. Any follow-up tests and vaccinations will be charged separately. A list of vaccination fees is [on page 8](#).

During the medical exam

The medical examination will include a medical history review, physical examination, and chest X-ray, gonorrhea test, and blood tests (for applicants 15 years of age or older). The United States also requires tuberculosis (TB) testing for all applicants two years of age and older. *You will typically need two appointments to complete all required tests.* Please be prepared to discuss your medical history, medications you are taking, and current treatments you are undergoing. U.S. immigration law requires immigrant visa applicants to obtain certain vaccinations prior to the issuance of a visa. Current immigrant visa vaccination requirements are available on [CDC.Gov](#). 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Medical Exam Instructions



After the medical exam

When your examination is completed, the doctor will either provide you with exam results in a sealed envelope or send them directly to the U.S. Consulate. **IF GIVEN AN ENVELOPE TO CARRY TO YOUR INTERVIEW, DO NOT OPEN THIS ENVELOPE.** Instead, bring it to your visa interview. Any x-rays taken will be given to you. You **DO NOT** need to bring the x-rays to your visa interview unless you suffer from tuberculosis (TB). However, you **must** carry the x-rays with you when you travel to the United States for the first time. The medical report must be less than six months old when you enter the United States as an immigrant.

Please use the list below to determine the items that every applicant must bring to the immigrant visa interview.

Any documents that are not in English must be accompanied by a certified English translation:

- ☐ Printed confirmation of your online registration of a delivery address for returning your passport and documents (see [Step 1](#)). Every immigrant visa applicant must register at www.ustraveldocs.com/eg/ before their interview.
- ☐ A copy of your NVC interview letter (does not apply to Diversity Visa, fiancé(e), adoptive, or asylee/refugee applicants).
- ☐ Unexpired passport valid for six (6) months beyond your intended date of entry to the United States and a photocopy of the biographic page (where your name and photo are located).
- ☐ Two (2) color photographs of each person applying for a visa (5 cm x 5 cm, or 2 inch x 2 inch). Please review our [online photo requirements](#).
- ☐ Confirmation page from the Form DS-260 Application for an Immigrant Visa you submitted online at <https://ceac.state.gov/ceac/>.
- ☐ Your **original** birth certificate, English translation and a photocopy.
- ☐ Medical examination results in a sealed envelope (*if the physician gives you these results*).

Applicants who fall into any category listed in italics below should bring these additional documents:

For family-based visa applications:

- ☐ The appropriate [Form I-864 Affidavit of Support](#) for each financial sponsor along with a photocopy of the sponsor's IRS transcript or most recent U.S. federal income tax return, and any relevant W-2s.
- ☐ Proof of your U.S. petitioner's status and [domicile](#) in the United States (photocopy of a U.S. passport, naturalization certificate, or lawful permanent resident card).
- ☐ Evidence of the relationship between the petitioner and visa applicant (such as photographs, letters, or emails).
- ☐ *If you are married: Your **original** marriage certificate, English translation and a photocopy.*
- ☐ *If you were previously married: Your **original** divorce or spouse's death certificate, English translation and a photocopy.*
- ☐ *If you are older than 16 years of age: The **original** police certificate from your country of current residence and countries of previous residence. If these three items are **all** true, you must bring a more recent police certificate to the interview:*
 - 1. You are older than 16 years;
 - 2. You obtained a police certificate and submitted it to NVC more than one year ago; and
 - 3. You still live in the country that issued the police certificate.
- ☐ *For employment-based visa applications: Letter from your U.S. employer dated less than one month ago.*
- ☐ *If you have ever been convicted of a crime: Court and criminal records, English translation and a photocopy.*
- ☐ *If you have served in any country's military: Military records, English translation and a photocopy.*

- ☐ *If you are adopted:* Adoption papers or custody documents, English translation and a photocopy.
- ☐ *If you are the petitioner's stepchild:* The **original** marriage certificate of the petitioner and your biological parent, English translation and a photocopy along with divorce records for any previous marriages of either parent.

Interview Guidelines



Sending documents to the U.S. Embassy in Muscat

If the U.S. Embassy requests additional information or documentation from you, the consular officer will provide instructions on how to submit those to the embassy.

Rescheduling or cancelling your interview

If you are unable to attend your appointment, please use the [Visa Navigator](#) to notify the consular section. **There may be a significant wait before the next available appointment**, so please attempt to attend the date already assigned. For some family-based and employment preference visa categories, a visa became available within the month you have been scheduled by NVC. DV applicants should be aware that visas are numerically limited and must be issued by September 30 of the program year. **There is no guarantee that a visa will still be available on the date of your rescheduled interview.** Please carefully consult the [Visa Bulletin](#) before you decide to reschedule your interview.

Security screening procedures

All visitors to the U.S. Embassy in Muscat must follow certain security procedures. Any visitor who declines to be screened by U.S. Embassy security personnel will be unable to enter the embassy. To avoid delaying your entry and that of those in line behind you, please bring only what is required for your interview. Cell phones, electronics, large bags, and oversize items are not allowed into the embassy. Due to space limitations, do not arrive before your scheduled appointment.

Accompanying persons

Attorneys are **not** permitted to accompany clients into the waiting room or to their interview. Only the following persons may accompany a visa applicant to their interview:

- Interpreter: Applicants should bring ONE interpreter if they do not speak English or Arabic well enough to participate in an interview.
- Special Needs Visitors: Applicants should bring ONE person to help if they are elderly, disabled, or a minor child.

Immigrant visa fees

If you have not paid all required fees to the National Visa Center, please be prepared to pay these fees on the day of your interview. All fees may be paid in either U.S. dollars or the Omani Rial equivalent. We accept cash and card payments only. Please bring the **exact** cash amount. *Please note that if you are found ineligible to receive a visa, the application fee cannot be refunded.* A complete list of fees can be found at travel.state.gov.

Do not make travel plans outside of Oman

If your visa is approved, we will keep your passport at the embassy while we prepare your immigration packet and print a visa for your passport. If you have to travel within Oman while your passport is still with us, please make sure you have a valid picture ID other than your passport. We will return your passport to you via courier service to an Aramex office of your choice (see [Step 1](#)).



After Your Visa Interview

A consular officer can make a decision on a visa application only after reviewing the formal application and interviewing the applicant. ***There is no guarantee that you will receive a visa.*** Do not sell your house, car or property, resign from your job or make non-refundable flight or other travel arrangements until you have received your immigrant visa.

If more information is needed

Sometimes a consular officer is unable to make a decision on a visa application because he/she needs to review additional documents, or the case requires further administrative processing. *When additional documents are requested*, the consular officer will give you a refusal letter that asks you to submit additional documents. The letter will include instructions on how to send those documents to the embassy.

Administrative processing takes additional time after the interview. Most administrative processing is resolved within 90 days. However, the timing varies based on the circumstances of each case. Before inquiring about the status of administrative processing, please wait **at least** 90 days after your interview.

What happens after visa approval

Passport, Visa, and Sealed Immigrant Packet – We will place your immigrant visa on a page in your passport. Please review your visa to make sure there are no spelling errors. When applicable to your case, you will receive a sealed envelope containing documents that you must give to U.S. immigration authorities when you arrive in the United States for the first time. ***Do not open this envelope. You must carry it with you; do not put it in your checked luggage.*** If you receive X-rays during your medical examination, carry those with you and give them to the U.S. immigration authorities.

USCIS Immigrant Fee – All individuals who are issued immigrant visas overseas must **pay an Immigrant Fee** to U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) **prior to traveling** to the United States. This fee is for processing your residency status and printing your Permanent Resident Card. The only people exempt from paying this fee are: children entering the United States under the Hague Process, returning residents, Afghan Special Immigrant Visa applicants and people traveling on a K visa.

When You Should Travel – You must enter the United States *before* the expiration date on your visa, which is usually six (6) months from the date of printing. Your visa cannot be extended, and all fees are nonrefundable. The principal applicant must enter **before or at the same time** as other family members with visas. Unless they are eligible for benefits under the Child Status Protection Act, children who are issued a visa before turning 21 years of age must enter the United States **before** their 21st birthday to avoid losing their immigrant status.

Getting a Green Card – Your Form I-551 Permanent Resident Card, also known as a green card, will be automatically mailed to the address in the United States that you write in your visa application form. This is a very important document that proves you have permission to reside in the United States. *Do not travel outside of the United States until you receive your Permanent Resident Card. Once your card is issued, you should not stay outside of the United States for more than one year. If you do, you will lose your status as a Lawful Permanent Resident.*

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After Your Visa Interview



Children's Issues – In the United States, children are required to have certain vaccinations before they can enroll in school. We recommend that you bring your child's complete vaccination records with you to the United States. If your child is adopted, you have full custody as a result of a divorce, or you share custody with another parent, you should bring a copy of all applicable adoption or custodial papers from the authoritative court in your home country. You will need these papers (translated into English) for issues such as school enrollment, medical care, and eventual citizenship.

Diversity Visa Applicants – Additional Information



If you are interviewing for a Diversity Visa (DV), all of the above instructions apply to you. Please schedule and attend a medical examination prior to your visa interview and gather the required documents.

*Below are additional instructions that apply **only** to DV applicants.*

Bring to your interview

In addition to the documents listed on the Pre-Interview Checklist in this package, DV applicants should also bring the following items to your visa interview:

- ☐ Appointment information printed from the “Entrant Status Check” on the [E-DV website](#).
- ☐ Documents showing that you have either a qualifying high school education **OR** have two (2) years of qualifying work experience in the last five years immediately prior to application (for the principal applicant only; more information is available at [travel.state.gov](#)).
- ☐ Payment in cash or credit of the \$330 Diversity Visa Application Fee.

Review your DV Lottery entry

Prior to your visa interview, we recommend that you review the data on your initial E-DV entry. On your initial E-DV application, you must have correctly entered your marital status. If you are legally married you must have listed your spouse, even if you are currently separated from him/her (unless your spouse is a U.S. citizen or Lawful Permanent Resident).

Additionally, you must have listed ALL of your living children who are unmarried and under 21 years old. This includes your natural children, your spouse’s children, or children you have formally adopted in accordance with the laws of your country.

Failure to have listed an existing spouse or children at the time of your entry in the Diversity Visa lottery will result in the denial of your visa and visas for your family. Any fees paid to the U.S. government in support of your visa application(s) are nonrefundable. If you failed to include a child who had already been born, or a spouse to whom you were married when you entered the lottery, you should not proceed with the visa application.
